What are Stephen Ministers?

According to the Stephen Ministries website, the organization was named for St. Stephen, one of the seven deacons appointed by the Apostles to distribute food and charitable aid to the poorer members of the community in the early Church (Acts 6:5).

It is a nondenominational Christian organization that cares for people in distress. It was founded in 1975 by Rev. Kenneth C. Haugk in St. Louis, Missouri, and is still headquartered there.

We care for those facing some crisis in life, for instance, illness, death of a loved one, divorce, relocation, or financial setback.

Moments in CRFUMC History The spiritual life and outreach of the church.

It was a time of beginnings. Castle Rock was a struggling community in 1874. When, in competition was Sedalia and Franktown (then called Frank's Town), it was decided to locate a new courthouse here. Douglas County, a part of Colorado territory, had previously extended to the Kansas line and was included in Kansas territory. It was not until 1876 the Colorado became a state.

Into this primitive situation came Rev. C. A. Brooks on May 17, 1874, to preach the first sermon in Castle Rock. He preached in a carpenter shop and appropriately his text was Matthew 13:55: "is not this the carpenter's son? Is not his mother called Mary? And his brethren and James and Joseph and Simon and Judas?"



After the establishment of the Castle Rock circuit in August, Rev. Brooks returned as the first minister. He preached here every Sunday. Monthly services were held in Sedalia, Spring Valley, Hilltop, Glen Grove, Greenland, Parker, and Founders, some on Sunday afternoons or even on Saturday nights.

Rev. Brooks wrote in his report, "the religious condition of the circuit was terribly discouraging, but God was with us at some points and helped us in the work. At Castle Rock and Bear Canyon, Sunday schools and class meetings were put underway. In January of 1875 a protracted meeting at the former place, resulted in a number of conversions, both in and out of the church and seven accessions to our membership on probation and two by letter."
